If you have any allergies or dietary requirements, please inform your server.



Mauretania £10

Woodford Reserve, Lot 40, passionfruit, tarragon, ginger kombucha.

Mauretania Public House was built in 1870 and stands at the foot of Park Street. Named after the RMS Mauretania, the building is decked out with original interiors from the ship, which also served as the inspiration behind the historic and recently re-ignited neon sign.



Dugout £10

Tapatio Blanco, Strega, hops, peach, tonic.

Birthplace of the Bristol Sound and once famous as the home of Massive Attack, during the 80s The Dugout brought together a generation of visionary DJs who mashed punk, soul, hip-hop, reggae, funk, dub, jazz, disco and groove behind the decks.

Angel Inn £10

Kyrö Napue, Åhus Akvavit, pear, yuzu, white chocolate, oat.

The Angel Inn is unique for having a trapdoor in the bar that leads to an eerie cellar, previously used as a holding cell for prisoners awaiting sentencing. Convicts would be held there for days on end, whilst above, the inn would continue its regular service, with customers none the wiser.

Rhubarb Tavern £10

Belvedere, Rhubarb Triangle Gin, rhubarb, oat, soda.

During the 1600s, the Rhubarb Tavern was built on the site of an old farmhouse, backdropped by the picturesque area of Barton Hill, with its winding lanes and rolling fields of rhubarb. Rhubarb was farmed commercially in Bristol until the 1940s, and though the trade has since died out, the tavern stands as an ode to the area's past.



Cornubia £12

Banks 5 Island, Sauternes, green tea, pineapple, lime, fizz.

Built around 1775, Cornubia is the old Roman name for Cornwall. This den was probably named after the SS Cornubia which was a paddle steamer that carried mail and passengers from St Ives to Bristol. Originally there were 18 inns and taverns on Temple Street and the Cornubia is one of the few that has survived.



Seven Stars £10

Portobello Navy, matcha, coconut water cordial.

The Seven Stars' proudest claim to fame is its past landlord's contribution to the abolition of the slave trade. In 1787, landlord Thompson met with Thomas Clarkson to help him gather crucial information for his campaign: information which would later be used in Parliament by William Wilberforce to eventually bring about slavery's abolition.

Quay Head House £12

Botanist, Noilly Prat, Lustau Blanco, O Reizinho, red pepper, thyme.

Built around 1850, Quay Head House was used as a meeting point for merchants, as it was the furthest point up the river for boats to dock before the floating harbour was built. The building is now home to our sister venue, The Milk Thistle, and its historic vault has been reincarnated as The Milk Thistle's basement bar.



Coronation Tap £10

Hennessey VS, pomegranate, Granny Smith soda.

The Coronation Tap is Clifton's longest running cider house. During the 60s, when cider houses began to garner a rowdy reputation, landlord Dick Bradstock used his pub to reform this image by demanding the highest standard of etiquette from his guests. Nowadays the rules are a bit more relaxed. Renowned for their own Exhibition Cider, at 8.4%, the Cori Tap is now home to the infamous 10 before 10 challenge. But consider yourself warned, the challenge is certainly not for the faint of heart..



Hatchet £12

Del Maguey Vida, Cocchi Americano, Riesling, gentian, pine.

Licensed back in 1606, The Hatchet Inn is Bristol's oldest remaining drinking den, named in honour of its former regulars, the rangers of Leigh Woods, which at the time stretched as far as Park Street. Over the years, the inn has accumulated a certain mystique; the most gruesome legend has it that beneath its layers of paint, the pub door is swathed in human skin.

Glenmorangie 10, St Germain, Lillet, IPA, verjus, soda.

The Packhorse was formerly managed by William Herapath, whose son made his bones performing Britain's first forensic autopsy, enabling the capture of the notorious Bristol poisoner. Herapath Jr went on to establish the Bristol Medical School, while The Packhorse continued its own important mission: supplying Lawrence Hill with quality booze and creating a hub for Bristol's biker community.

Cooke's Coffee House £10

Jameson Caskmates, Extract cold brew, nitro.

Irish Coffee £10

Redbreast Lustau, Extract coffee, cream.

Cooke's Coffee House is the oldest coffee shop in Bristol. Surviving under various guises and long before artisan cafes popped up on every corner of the city, Cooke's were roasting their beans on site and filling Corn Street with the rich aroma of freshly brewed coffee. One of the longest running iterations, Carwardines, sadly ceased trading in 1996 after a 59 year run. Cooke's remained closed until 2002 when it was resurrected and duly renamed 'Café Revival'.

Hole in the Wall £10

Pusser's Gunpowder Proof, Ardbeg 10, Campari, passionfruit, lime.

The inspiration for Treasure Island's Spy Glass Tavern, the Hole in the Wall is famous for its "Spy Room". Here, lookouts stood guard, ready to warn punters of approaching Navy press gangs who would crack their drunken prey over the heads before shipping them out to sea. Once on board, their hostages would have no option but to enlist.



Granary £10

Jack Daniel's Rye, peanut butter, banana, bacon.

Originally run as a jazz club, The Granary reinvented itself as a rock venue in November 1968. With the security run by bikers, it hosted acts from Iron Maiden and Dire Straits to Motorhead and Status Quo. Now a fish restaurant, it's hard to imagine motorbikes thundering past and the screeching of guitar solos echoing from within.



Hyde rum blend #1, banana, coconut.
*Mount Gay Black Barrel, Trois Rivieres, Smith & Cross

A Caribbean haven amidst the city smoke, the Western Star Domino Club was a popular hangout for Bristol's West Indian community throughout the 1980s. Another of the city's favourite music venues, the bar also hosted Erasure's very first gig, cementing its cultural legacy... literally; its remains lie beneath what is now the Staples car park. All good things must come to an end.



Corn Exchange £10

Buffalo Trace, butter, corn, maple, pecan.

A popular 60s music venue (with headliners including The Who, Cream and Pink Floyd), The Corn Exchange still displays a clock, dating from 1822, that bears two minute hands spaced 11 minutes apart. Whilst the rest of the country adopted Greenwich Mean Time in 1847, Bristol held its ground for another 5 years. So, if we're going by Bristol Time, looks like you've got time for another round.



Old Duke £10

Sazerac Rye, Remy Martin 1738, Madeira, pineapple, tonka bean.

The Old Duke as we know it today was born in 1967 when the landlord's wife decided to experiment with live jazz upstairs. It was such a success it became a regular fixture, and though the pub originally got its name from the Duke of Cambridge, it is now more fittingly understood as a homage to Duke Ellington, whose melodies have inspired the musicians who perform there to this day.

Guilbert's £10

No.3, Antica Formula, Chartreuse, cocoa butter, chocolate, black truffle.

In 1761, Joseph Fry and John Vaughan bought a small shop from an apothecary, and with it the patent for the chocolate refining process. 'Fry's' became the first commercially produced chocolate bar, and laid the foundations for the development of the local chocolate trade. One business inspired by the legacy of Fry's was Guilbert's. Guilbert's has stood the test of time, surviving the events of the past 100 years, including the bombing of its factory during the Second World War, earning itself the status of the longest running chocolatier in Bristol.



Cheese Lane Distillery £12

Circumstantial, Port Charlotte 10, honey, kalamata olive, rosemary.

The Bristol Whiskey Distillery, situated on Cheese Lane, ran between 1761 and 1940 when bomb damage forced it to close. The grain used was grown both around the distillery and in the nearby area of St Phillips, and the resulting whiskeys were used in Irish and Scottish blends. New distilleries have been springing up in Bristol since 2014, a testament to the creativity of the people who live here.


